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Hastings and Rother Arts Education Network Report of the Trustees For the year ended 31 March 2020

The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their report and the financial statements for the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. The Trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objectives of the CIO as laid out in the governing document are:

- 1. To work with children, young people, artists, cultural and educational organisations to strengthen links between great cultural provision and learning opportunities.
- 2. To advance the knowledge, skills, confidence and capabilities of children and young people helping them to grow into active, culturally engaged citizens.
- 3. To develop children and young people's mental, physical and moral wellbeing through arts and culture.
- 4. To increase opportunities for all children and young people in Hastings, Rother and the surrounding area to participate fully in arts and culture.
- 5. To ensure a strong commitment to equality, inclusion and diversity is embedded throughout our practices and programmes.

The trustees have considered the Charity Commision's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance 'public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

2019 -20 started off as a good year with a clear idea of what it was the charity wanted to achieve but ended quite differently. So until March we at HRAEN managed the following;

- To run 2 x Networking sessions for teachers, artists and cultural organisations. Maintained the www.hraen.co.uk website.
- · Managed social media sites @HRAENetwork. Ensured representation by steering group members on local partnership groups including the Hastings & Rother Cultural Leaders Group.
- · Developing the Schools Connect project working with Artswork and the Hastings Opportunity Area to bring Shakespeare to a wider audience on a different style. Plans were made for the visit to the Globe theatre at the end of March and a Shakespeare residential over the first week of the Easter holiday. This quickly had to be changed.

In the spring we were due to have Shakespeare workshops and a trip to the Globe Theatre. In early summer we were going to continue working in schools on Shakespeare days and weeks.

All the creative work you had been producing in schools and colleges was going to be showcased at the Takeover Day at the De La Warr Pavilion in June. There was going to be theatre, curated art, film, fashion, dance, live music and so much more!

All change in 2020!!

This summer we have been working on a virtual arts festival to fill the arts gap for children and young people up to 25 years old. It has been a brilliant summer of arts at home and we have received some great creative work from young people.

- The Hastings Opportunity Area Winter enrichment funding has also allowed up to expand the partnership project with Hofesh Shechter Dance Company bring more workshops and opportunities to perform to schools in Hastings and Rother.
- 3 x dance workshops led by Hofesh Shechter dancers were run at the Source Park in Hastings with a final performance of the work produced at a performance at Hastings Academy. Ark Alexandra have also become a Hofesh Hub School on the back of the project to continue the partnership work.
- · Regularly report back the work of HRAEN to the Hastings & Rother Cultural Education Partnership (CEP role undertaken through Culture East Sussex).
- · We are now 1 year into our 5 year business plan, however after the affects of Coivd-19 we will be looking to repurpose the business plan to fit the ever changing educational landscape.
- · Post February 2020 the Charity had to relook at how it was going to deliver its plans. Schools and teachers had started to become wary of mixing from February onwards and larger gatherings started to be seen as inappropriate and the February network meeting was cancelled.
- · Covid-19 shut schools from the Easter holiday until the summer, with teachers responding to requirements form government the focus during this period of lockdown was on: keeping schools open for keyworker children; moving learning on line; supporting vulnerable children. HRAEN had one Zoom steering group meeting to keep the work ticking over and begin to move projects on line.

The trustees have agreed to retain a reserve of £3,000 which they believe is sufficient to ensure the future development of the charity at this stage.

1. Accounting Policies

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, except for investments which are included at market value and the revaluation of certain fixed assets and in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), and the Charities Act 2011.

Hastings and Rother Arts Education Network meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

Going concern

The financial statements are prepared, on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention.

Funds

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Such funds may be held in order to finance both working capital and capital investment.

Designated funds comprise of unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds have been provided to the charity for particular purposes, and it is the policy of the board of trustees to carefully monitor the application of those funds in accordance with the restrictions placed upon them.

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds or on the allocation of funds to designated funds, other than that described above

Incoming resources

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the Charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

At the balance sheet date the Charity had not yet received any funding.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended when there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Charity to the expenditure.

Taxation

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the company, and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.
